Chair, Jerry Sampson called the meeting to order and read the Indigenous Land Acknowledgement.

1. Approval of Agenda

4. Business Arising from the Minutes

4.1 Emergency Preparedness Report

Status Report

Various departments will be requested to compile existing emergency preparedness plans and identify gaps where the Climate Action Advisory Committee can provide support. Input will be collected over the coming weeks.

Gaps and Challenges

The Committee discussed who maintains overarching responsibility for emergency preparedness information, whether communication with residents is sufficient during different types of events, and whether there is a consolidated plan or if departments are working independently.

Future Planning

The Committee considered the scope of preparedness, including climate-related events and broader emergencies. Each department (Fire, Library, Parks & Recreation, Clerks, Public Works, and Administration) will identify vulnerabilities, outline existing plans, and contribute to a communication strategy. The goal is to develop a blueprint that could serve as a public-facing document.

Resolution:

Moved by Jim Campbell, Seconded by Councillor Beelen, Be It Resolved That the staff liaison prepare a report to Council on developing an Emergency Preparedness Report that outlines the current status, identifies gaps and challenges, provides recommendations for future planning, and includes departmental CO₂ reduction plans for future implementation, to be presented to Council for endorsement. Motion Carried.

5.1 Fire Events

The Committee discussed the increasing prevalence of wildfires and the importance of monitoring changing environmental conditions in Ontario.

5.2 Environmental Management Plans

Discussion took place regarding the use of environmental management plans in the tendering process, including potential benefits, costs, and policy implications. It was noted that such plans could be considered for future tendering of municipal projects.

6. Future Projects

The Committee discussed the importance of reducing CO₂ emissions and identifying opportunities for the Township to lead by example, such as through future vehicle purchases and operational practices. Public education and departmental planning were noted as key elements to support emission reduction efforts.



The survey will remain open until October 31, 2025. Your input could make all the difference. Take part today to help us build a safer, stronger Simcoe County.


About the County of Simcoe's Emergency Management program
